Concept Note

हिमाली र पर्वतीय भू-प्रदेशहरू जैविक विविधता, सांस्कृतिक सम्पदा, र परम्परागत पारिस्थितिक ज्ञानका धनी क्षेत्र हुन्।तथापि, मानव केन्द्री युग (एन्थ्रोपोसिन) -मा तीव्र औद्योगिकीकरण, सहरीकरण, जलवायु परिवर्तन, र पर्यावरणीय प्रदूषणका कारण यी संवेदनशील पारिस्थितिकीय प्रणालीहरू गम्भीर संकटमा परेका छन्। मानव-प्रकृति अन्तरक्रिया विघटन हुँदै गइरहेका सन्दर्भमा, परम्परागत ज्ञान प्रणाली, साहित्य, लोकवार्ता र सामुदायिक अभ्यासहरूले दिगो विकास र पारिस्थितिक सन्तुलन पुनःस्थापित गर्न सक्षम माध्यमको रूपमा कार्य गर्छन्। उक्त सन्दर्भमा, यस सङ्गोष्ठीले बहु-आयामिक दृष्टिकोणबाट हिमाली तथा पर्वतीय सन्दर्भको विश्लेषण गर्ने उद्देश्य राख्दछ। विकास नीति, पारिस्थितिक न्याय, गैर-सरकारी पहल र वातावरणीय साहित्यका अन्तर्वस्तुहरू समेट्दै यस गोष्ठीले पर्यावरणीय संकटको सैद्धान्तिक र व्यवहारिक समाधानको खोजी गर्नेछ। यसले मानव-प्रकृति सहअस्तित्वलाई सुदृढ गर्दै, पारिस्थितिकीय स्थायित्व र सामाजिक न्यायबिच सन्तुलन कायम गर्ने वैकल्पिक दृष्टिकोण प्रस्ताव गर्ने लक्ष्य लिएको छ।

The Himalayan and Sub- Himalayan Regions presents a rich tapestry of historical, political, cultural and ecological biodiversity. It now, however, finds itself entwined within the fabric of global environmental challenges. Emergence of the epoch of the Anthropocene, and its impact upon the ecosystem has posed multiple challenges to environmental biodiversity, particularly in the Himalayan and Sub- Himalayan Regions.

Intensification of anthropogenic activities on earth has undermined and disrupted human- nature interactions in maintaining ecological balance through traditional practices and knowledge systems with the advent of Enlightenment, modernity, development policies of both the colonial as well as the post-colonial state

This has led to ecological imbalances, climatic change and geological vulnerabilities, including glacier retreat, changing monsoon patterns and increase in natural disasters such as landslides, floods including glacial lakes outburst flood. Such myriad challenges necessitate a multifaceted approach towards devising techniques of sustainable management that includes robust nvironmental governance, national and regional policies.

It is essential to balance economic growth with ecological sustainability taking into account the role of non-state actors including NGOs and civil society organizations in fostering public-private partnership and community participation in conservation initiatives. These areas characterized by unique geographical and cultural landscapes also serve as repositories of rich literary, oral and cultural traditions. The seminar seeks to explore the intersection of ecological concerns and cultural narratives, emphasizing how literature, folklore, and oral traditions engage with themes of environmental fragility, human resilience and sustainable development. Through an examination of linguistic and cultural traditions, the seminar will highlight the ways in which literature and folklore document ecological wisdom, critique environmental degradation and envision alternative futures.

Further, the seminar highlights the critical issue of environment pollution and its profound impact on biodiversity in the ecologically sensitive Himalayan and Sub- Himalayan regions. The current status of biodiversity, species vulnerability, habitat degradation in these regions along with management strategies to mitigate the effects of pollution in these fragile ecosystems demands immediate attention.

The seminar will provide a platform for interdisciplinary discussions by bringing together insights from ecology, politics, history, literary studies, cultural anthropology and scientific management strategies in biodiversity conservation. Through a focused deliberation, the seminar seeks to take steps towards the preservation of these fragile ecologies and ensure a harmonious balance between nature and human beings in the face of the ever-growing penetration of developmental discourse. To discuss these broad issues this National Seminar invites academicians, researchers and scholars to submit their valuable papers exploring the complex challenges confronting the Himalayan and Sub- Himalayan regions.

How to reach Gorubathan

- 1. From Siliguri Distance: ~65/74 km | Time: 1:30-2:00 hrs
- By Road: Direct buses, private taxis and shared Jeeps through Sevoke Road, Odlabari, Damdim and then Gorubathan
- By Rail: Board a local train from Siliguri Junction/New Jalpaiguri (NJP) to Malbazar (New Mal Junction) or Damdim Station, then take a road transfer to Gorubathan.
- 2. From Darjeeling (Distance: ~ 90/100 kms) | Time: 4-4.5 hrs
- By Road: Darjeeling → Teesta Bazaar → Coronation Bridge → Damdim → Gorubathan (90 km)
- Or via Darjeeling → Rohini Road → Siliguri → Damdim → Gorubathan (100Kms)
- 3. From Kalimpong Distance: ~ 55/61kms | Time: 2-2.5 hrs
- By Road: Kalimpong → Algarah → Lava → Gorubathan (55 kms)
- Or via Teesta Bazaar and Damdim → Gorubathan (61 kms)
- 4. From Gangtok (Sikkim) Distance: ~ 102/138 kms | Time: 3:45-4:15 hrs
- By Road: Gangtok → Rangpo → Coronation Bridge → Damdim → Gorubathan (102 kms)
- Or via Rangpo→ Kalimpong→ Algarah → Lava → Gorubathan (138 kms)
